Dear Friends of Washington Revels,

Thank you for being part of the Washington Revels community!

As we reflect on the past year, I am filled with gratitude for the people who make our work possible—our audiences, performers, volunteers, donors, partners, and staff. Together, we continue to demonstrate that when people come together through music, dance, storytelling, and shared traditions, they build stronger, more connected communities.

This year has been one of profound creative growth, vibrant collaboration, and deeper community impact. From our beloved seasonal events to educational programs and community celebrations, Washington Revels has continued to fulfill its mission of bringing people together across generations and cultures. Each performance or event has been a reminder that traditions are not simply preserved, they are lived, shared, and renewed with every new participant. We were proud to present 68 artistic performances and events reaching almost 15,000 patrons, and our educational program expanded to reach 40 new students, sparking creative curiosity in the next generation. None of this would be possible without your generosity and commitment. Your support enables us to create meaningful artistic experiences, expand access to our programs, and ensure that the traditions we celebrate continue to inspire future generations. We truly cannot do this work without you.

As you read through this annual report, I hope you'll see more than numbers and accomplishments. I hope you'll see the faces, voices, and stories of the people whose lives have been touched by Washington Revels—and recognize your own part in those stories. Every program, every concert, every dance, and every chorus sung together is a testament to what we can create when we come together with open hearts.

This annual report tells a story that belongs to all who have been part of Washington Revels during the past year. It is a story of how musical and dramatic traditions can transcend entertainment to deepen our understanding of what it means to be human. It is also a story about the power of community, the precious bond that connects us and gives purpose to our work.

Over the last year, Washington Revels has continued to fulfill its mission with remarkable success. We have strengthened the efficiency of our operations, expanded programs that bring our work to underserved communities, and earned multiple awards recognizing the excellence of our performances. Most importantly, we have continued to create experiences that inspire people of all ages to connect, participate, and become their best selves.

At the same time, this year has reminded us that every meaningful endeavor faces challenges. While the impact and effectiveness of Washington Revels have never been stronger, the organization has navigated significant financial pressures over the past two years. These challenges have resulted from several factors, including a broad decline in live audience attendance following the COVID-19 pandemic, reductions in institutional funding amid a changing governmental landscape, and the loss of Lisner Auditorium as the venue for our winter production.

In response, our dedicated staff and leadership have approached these challenges with creativity, discipline, and determination. Through careful planning and innovative thinking, they have reduced the financial deficit by well over half while preserving the programs, people, and artistic excellence that define Washington Revels. Their efforts have demonstrated both the resilience of the organization and the strength of its mission.

At a time when division and intolerance too often dominate public discourse, Washington Revels continues to offer something profoundly important: opportunities for people to come together in celebration of our shared humanity. Through music, storytelling, and community participation, we remain committed to fostering connection, understanding, and joy.

The accomplishments highlighted in this report reflect the dedication of our staff, artists, volunteers, partners, and supporters. Thanks to their commitment, Washington Revels enters the future with confidence, building on a strong foundation and guided by a mission that remains as relevant and necessary as ever. I am optimistic that the years ahead will bring new opportunities for growth, impact, and continued service to our community.

WHO WE ARE

Washington Revels is a performing arts organization which creates musical and theatrical events, and educational programs that celebrate cultural traditions through music, song, dance, and storytelling. For over 40 years, we have served the Washington DC metropolitan area with distinctive participatory arts experiences that foster cultural understanding and community connections and contribute significantly towards building a stronger community for its residents.

Our mission is to connect people of all generations and backgrounds by celebrating diverse cultural traditions and shared humanity through educational and interactive performing arts. We present 60–70 live, interactive performances, reaching approximately 15,000 patrons annually. Our performances feature performers of varied ages, ethnic identities, and social backgrounds. Over 95% of our performances include interactive audience participation, and 50% or more are free, creating accessible experiences for all, especially underserved communities.

Community

Revels weaves connections between people and diverse cultures, helps to create understanding and a society that values harmony.

Tradition

Revels is for anyone who wants to share common ground through old and new traditions – connecting people across time and cultures.

Celebration

Revels spreads joy in every season, turning music, dance and folktales from around the world into magical experiences.



OUR ENSEMBLES

Gallery Voices

A select group of vocalists performing a tapestry of musical styles: Medieval, Renaissance, Early American hymns and folk songs, 19th and 20th-century part-songs, and more.

Heritage Voices

Heritage Voices is a multicultural, multigenerational community of performers that tells America's story through a diverse mix of historic tunes, ranging from music of the Civil War era to Civil Rights Movement freedom songs.

Jubilee Voices

An ensemble presenting African American songs and stories of struggle, perseverance, trials, triumphs, as expressed through a cappella vocal music and narratives.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Jubilee Voices

Documentary

Washington Revels proudly produced and premiered a documentary celebrating the enduring legacy of Washington Revels' Jubilee Voices, and its commitment to honoring and preserving the rich musical and cultural traditions of the African American experience. Through compelling performances and personal stories, the film illustrates the transformative impact of Jubilee Voice's work in advancing music, celebrating cultural heritage, and fostering meaningful community engagement, ensuring these traditions continue to inspire future generations. The documentary premiere in February 2026 at the Black Rock Center for the Arts was followed by a panel discussion with the film maker and a performance by Jubilee Voices ensemble. We distributed the documentary across multiple media platforms as part of the nation's 250th Anniversary celebrations.



Freedom Walk

Partnership

Washington Revels proudly co-hosted the Freedom Walk 2026 with two powerful performances on the kick-off rally on May 3rd and culmination celebration on July 1, by our vocal ensembles, Heritage Voices and Jubilee Voices. Freedom Walk 2026 was an 8-week long 750-mile traveling commemoration of the Underground Railroad from Maryland, USA to Ontario, Canada, in which participants retraced the route to freedom in the footsteps of 19th century self-liberators.

Led by historian Anthony Cohen, the two-month journey commemorated the nation's 250th anniversary, and traveled through Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and New York. The Harriet Tubman Journey to Freedom statue, depicting the famed abolitionist on a harrowing rescue mission, accompanied the walk. The large bronze sculpture, designed in 2019 by artist Wesley Wofford, evokes our nation's ceaseless struggle for freedom, and served as a focal point for participants to reflect, engage and unite.



Revels Kids

Educational Program Launch

In Fall 2025, we successfully launched the Revels Kids Educational Program, expanding opportunities for children, teens, and families to explore creativity, culture, and community through the arts. The program offers after-school creative arts classes and workshops that inspire participants to explore the connections among nature, geography, science, culture, and diverse global traditions. Through hands-on learning and artistic expression, participants build creativity, confidence, cultural awareness, and a deeper appreciation for the world around them.

Our inaugural after-school workshops were offered from October through December 2025, followed by a winter session from January through March 2026. The enthusiastic response from students and families demonstrated the community's strong interest in arts-based, multicultural learning experiences and established a solid foundation for the program's continued growth.



Community Celebrations

Annual Gatherings

Our Community Celebrations brought people of all ages together through music, dance, storytelling, and seasonal traditions that foster connection and belonging. Throughout the year, these free and accessible events celebrated the rich cultural diversity of our region while creating opportunities for communities to gather, share traditions, and build new ones.

The diverse array of cultural and civic events included participation in the Takoma Park Fourth of July Parade, Pub Sing at McGinty's Ale House in Silver Spring, Jewish holiday celebrations in partnership with the Capital Jewish Museum, the Echo Arts Festival, and the Talbot Bridge Walk. These events fostered connection, celebrated cultural traditions, and strengthened our commitment to building an inclusive and engaged community.



Winter Revels

Flagship Production

Our 43rd Annual Winter Revels continued a beloved tradition of using the performing arts to build cultural understanding and bring communities together. This year's fully staged production, *Andalusian Treasures* celebrated the rich musical and cultural heritage of medieval Spain, weaving together Jewish, Arabic, and Spanish music, dance, and drama in an original story inspired by the remarkable coexistence of Moorish, Sephardic, and Iberian cultures in ancient Al-Andalus. Featuring the acclaimed Trio Sefardi—Howard Bass, Susan Gaeta, and Tina Chancey—alongside Arab American vocalist and oud player Laith Alattar, with Abderrahim Amthqal on ney, Ali Bandeali on percussion, and the Washington Revels Brass and Chorus, this unforgettable performance celebrated the beauty of diverse musical traditions in a magical and immersive experience.



As our flagship production, the Winter Revels has become a cherished annual tradition that celebrates the December holidays, the Winter Solstice, and the return of light. Each December, more than 4,000 audience members experience this festive production, which draws on the music, rituals, and traditions of cultures from around the world, with a different cultural focus each year.

The December 2025 production, *Andalusian Treasures* was recognized as a finalist for the Most Creative Programming category for the Choralis Choral Music Awards and won the Best Holiday Programming award - a testament to its artistic excellence, and the creativity, dedication, and collaborative spirit of our performers, musicians, and production team.

Spring Revels

Annual Celebration

In May, we welcomed the arrival of Spring with vibrant community celebrations of traditional music and dance at the Glen Echo Park in Maryland and the National Cathedral in Washington, DC. Rooted in the rich heritage of western English Spring traditions, the events featured performances by Washington Revels' adult and children chorus, Maypole dancing, the crowning of festival monarchs, Spring mummers' play, and joyful audience participation. Our celebrations marked the seasonal re-opening of the 105-year-old Dentzel Carousel at Glen Echo Park's annual Carousel Day, and the closing of the annual All Hallows Guild Flower Mart at the Washington National Cathedral.



Black History Month

Annual Celebration

Black History Month 2026 held special significance as the nation marked 100 years of Black History commemorations. Throughout February, Washington Revels' Jubilee Voices ensemble celebrated this milestone by sharing the stories, music, and traditions that have shaped the African American experience. Highlights of our programming included Still We Rise, a concert at the Alexandria History Museum at the Lyceum, celebrating African American history, culture, and resilience through spirituals, gospel, and traditional songs; performances at the National Park Service's annual Frederick Douglass Birthday Celebration; and performances at the Josiah Henson Museum. Through these performances, Washington Revels continued its commitment to preserving and sharing traditional music as a living expression of history and culture. The events fostered learning, dialogue, and community connections.



Juneteenth

Annual Celebration

Throughout June, we honored Juneteenth with a series of free concerts, educational programs, and community events, and arts activities that commemorated the end of slavery in the United States while celebrating the rich history, resilience, and cultural contributions of African Americans. Presented across the Washington DC metropolitan area and online, these programs welcomed participants of all ages and created opportunities for learning, reflection and celebration.

Our Juneteenth programming featured music, storytelling, drama, and dance that brought African American history to life while highlighting the enduring legacy of the Civil Rights Movement. We partnered with local libraries, municipalities, and community organizations to expand access to these experiences and to engage diverse audiences.



Highlights included performances at Discoveries: The Library at the Mall at Anne Arundel County, Maryland featuring African American history and traditions with a cappella music, drama and dance; participation at Kensington's annual Juneteenth celebration; a commemorative concert at Shiloh Baptist Church in Alexandria, Virginia; and performances at the Community, Culture & Cuisine event co-hosted by the Lexington Park Business Association and St. Mary's County Arts Council in Maryland.

By combining artistic excellence with historical education, our Juneteenth programs fostered community dialogue, celebrated cultural heritage, and inspired audiences to reflect on the ongoing pursuit of freedom, equity and justice.

AUDIENCE IMPACT REPORT

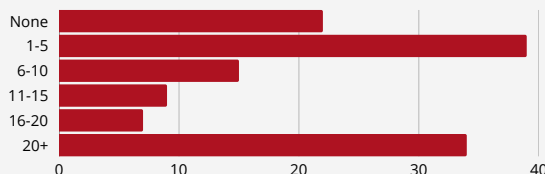

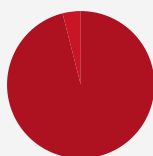

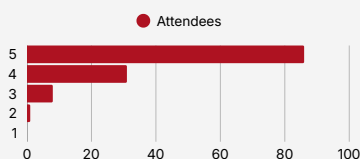

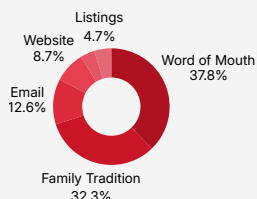
